

A Hathaway's Pond Dive Morning. Sunday, Oct. 31, 2021. Story & photos by Rob

In the aftermath of last week's powerful Nor'easter, which witnessed wave heights in excess of nearly 28', and still cresting at 10' on the South Shore and over 8' north of Cape Ann yesterday morning, new Neptune member, Rob Foley, and I felt it prudent to make a pond dive in lieu of a trip to the ocean. We met at

Hathaway's Pond at 9 AM, suited up, and beat most of the classes, but not all of the divers, into the water. Instead of using the Emergency Road launch entry point, we waded in from the beach side to avoid the scuba class divers assembling there.

For the most part our foresight paid off. Though not crystal clear, the 7-10' murky vis held as we finned slowly past an underwater assembly platform, the rusted out Saab, the American flag, the drive shaft, another platform with a direction indicator on top pointing the way out to the road entry, and



more.

We turned the dive a little more than a third of the way through our tanks and headed along the line leading to the sunken cabin cruiser. Commensurately, our trek began taking us deeper into the pond, as we lumbered along toward the wreck on the far side.

About the time we reached the 32' depth mark, our deepest on the 37 min, 59° dive, the vis suddenly dropped to near zero. A couple of divers, who had begun their dive earlier than we, had followed the same path a bit before us and stirred up the silt to such a degree, neither Rob nor I felt like continuing to the boat in zero vis. So, we turned left

(South), and took a course back to the line that would return us to our own entry point, the beach.

No sooner had we made the turn and kicked a few strokes in the new

direction than we ran into the tool garden, a repository of yard tools standing on end, including a wheel barrow. We lallygagged across the garden, found the return line, then headed southwest along it back toward the American flag, assembly platform, and the way out.

I forgot to mention we saw plenty of fish fry, fingerings as well as juvenile bass, one larger bass in the 1-2lb. range, and small schools of perch, plus lots of algae covering different parts of the silt- and grass-coated pond bottom.



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RobF, a great dive buddy, and I enjoyed a delightful relaxing dive together, on a beautiful Sunday morning, that ended at the 3A Café in North Plymouth,

where, joined by my wife, Carol, we wolfed down a great breakfast before calling it a dive day. Isn't diving into it a blast? Do it safely!


