the video clip. They enjoyed calm water and air temps in the 45°- 48° range. Ken said there was not too m u c h to see. Afterwards, they drove



around Cape Ann's Rockport checking out other dive site possibilities for future exploration. Sounds like they all enjoyed a nice day and dive on Massachusetts' northern Cape.

Peter came over at 9 AM and fashioned new, longer bands out of the tubing I had ordered to make the speargun easier to load. He had already done the same with his. The top band was entirely too short. Turns out he couldn't cock the top band either, and he's 2X—3X stronger than I am! When he finished, we drove over to Little Pond at Morton Park.

The weather was sunny and very windy when we arrived at the pond. Unfortunately, it was a beautiful spring day for the trout fisherman, too, who were out in droves. There was no place to dive anywhere around the pond that wasn't populated with fishermen, who most certainly would have been annoyed with us had we decided to make a dive there. So, we made a collective executive decision to drive 10 minutes down the road to John's Pond and give it another try. Nirvana! We had the pond to ourselves.

We unloaded our gear, Peter set up the target, and we went to work practicing our shooting with the new bands he created, which were much easier to load because of their longer length, even though they are the same diameter as the ones he replaced. After a couple of shots, he decided we should remove the roller band, the one on the bottom, and spend this summer learning how to use the guns on one band before adding the complexity of the roller band next year. He was right. It was much easier to handle the guns with one band instead of two. Plus it's difficult enough to learn how to do the complicated line wrap wearing 7 mm neoprene gloves. As a result of these changes, we both began hitting the target with every shot. We still have work to do perfecting our aim so that we can make head shots. Reliability will come with more practice.

Carol already had scoped out the best flights and made reservations for the two of us. We shared the info with Robbi, and by noon we were all ticketed round trip for what turned out to be a delightful week's stay on the beach at the Occidental Hotel Dive Resort in Cozumel, Mexico.

After checking in to the hotel, Robbi and I walked down to the beach, found the Dive Paradise dive shop, squared away our dive calendar and equipment needs for the week—100 cu ft tanks with Nitrox—then, headed back to our suite of two rooms for a long nap before supper. Naps were a necessity after a 3AM early bird wakeup call for our run to Logan International Airport.

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We made the 8:00AM two-tank boat dive everyday, Sunday through Tuesday, and added a night dive Tuesday evening. Wednesday was a recovery day so that Robbi could attend a necessary

As for the diving, the journal impressions I had of our experiences were as follows:

Sunday - Tuesday The diving had been good to great with vis ranging anywhere from 100' - 200' and water temps hovering around 81°F, regardless of depth. We wove through towers of coral heads at 82 feet, and drifted down Palancar Reef at around the 50' depth mark. I saw a couple of scorpion fish, one on the night dive, one yesterday on dive 2; a stingray and Jack tandem; a famous turtle named Carlos or Carlitos,

Friday It was raining today and diving had been canceled by the time we reached the dive shop. The expectation for 20 knot winds around 10 AM or so was realized. Fine with me because I wanted today off,

anyway, to let my gear dry some more—didn't happen 'cause of the rain—and pack.

Yesterday's dives were interesting to spectacular. We made a dive to the deeper coral heads that have swim through caves and tunnels but very few fish; this was followed by a shallower dive across a twisting plain full of submarine surprises in the form of spotted eagle rays, turtles, perhaps the largest girthed green moray eel I have ever seen, and much more. However, the famed endemic Cozumel toadfish eluded us once again.

Today, we ate lunch at a restaurant, Ix Kool, well known and loved for its authentic Mayan food. Simply outstanding! Best meal of the entire week hands down!! We also toured San Gervasio, the Mayan archaeological site

we had visited five years ago with Donn Ellerbrock from Columbus, who passed away not long after that trip. Unfortunately, nothing much has been restored since that time. We topped off the evening with a fabulous Mahi Mahi meal at a new restaurant on the waterfront in downtown Cozumel called Bajau.

Looking back on the week, the resort was very nice, the all inclusive food was excellent, and the booze flowed. The staff was terrific everywhere in the compound and at the dive shop, as were the boat crews and divermaster, and the grounds were simply beautiful. In and around Cozumel we found everyone we encountered to be helpful and friendly; just could not have asked for a better vacation or place to dive into it!
