& DIVES

Diving Fajardo Puerto Rico. Early December 2022. Story, video clip and links by Jason Brown

In early December, I did a nice Caribbean dive (#32 & #33 overall) in Fajardo, in Northeastern Puerto Rico. I had a great experience booking with Sea Ventures Fajardo (<u>https://divepuertorico.com/</u>).* Both the parking and dive shop are located close to the boat dock in the same marina. Sea Ventures also has a complete set of gear for rent (\$30!) if you don't want to travel with any gear down to Puerto Rico.



Both of the dive sites were at about 65

feet to a sandy bottom, about 1/4 mile from the Eastern shore of Palomino Island (<u>https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Isla_Palomino</u>).* The water was in the 83°-85° F range, warm enough for just a bathing suit and a rash guard! There's quite a bit of low coral reef in this section, with a sandy drop-off from 20 feet deep to more than 70 feet deep. From the boat, you can see where the light blue-green water abruptly changes to a darker blue as the sand drops away. The dive operator is also involved with coral restoration, which involves anchoring metal frames to the bottom and seeding them with pieces of coral.

Overall, Puerto Rico was a nice surprise - warm weather, warm water, and good diving close to my hotel. I made a 90 second video of footage I captured with my GoPro, included at the Youtube link below. The dive boat staff were professional, with all of the freshwater tanks, dry storage, and snacks I expected from a good dive boat - I expect to go back soon!

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Circleville (Ohio) Dive Center -**South Quarry**. Saturday, December 10. Story & photos by Rob

Following the Tuesday night, Dec. 6 General Meeting, I packed up my dive gear and an

overnight bag and drove to Columbus, Ohio to visit my dermatologist for a followup to the surgery I had in late July and to have a skin check. I took advantage of the trip to make a dive in the South Quarry at the Circleville Dive Center with long time Ohio

We unloaded our gear under the pavilion and suited up in our drysuits suits in the changing shack. Fortunately, Brent had

brought an electric space heater and had already preheated the shack by the time I arrived. Once geared up, we clambered down the stairs, slipped into the water, dumped the air out of our

BCs, and headed for the 18 wheeler flatbed platform. On the way down a few bluegills flitted about, as if to greet us. The vis was anywhere from 3' - 7'. While trying to take a few video clips with my new SeaLife ReefMaster 4X, I noticed a familiar sensation: water seeping down my neck seal. I had forgotten to ensure it was properly set. Drat and double drat. I knew I was in for a soaking in the 43° water. I would not be dry at all.

We floated along fairly easily and saw most of the sights. Forty-two minutes into the 19' deep dive, the seepage had reached below my waistline, which was about the same time we had returned to the entry point. I signaled to my buddy John I was calling it quits because I was soaked from head to toe.



Sure enough, nothing was dry when I removed my drysuit and sopping undergarments. Burgers, iced tea, coffee, and great conversation awaited us at Gibby's, the local goto restaurant in Circleville, where we traded stories, caught up with each other, and enjoyed each other's company. Afterwards, it was time to hit the interstate and make the return trip to Mass through a light to moderate snow storm that followed me all the way back home. It's always a bit sad leaving such good friends behind.

Club Dive - 40 steps (Nahant). Sunday December 4, 2022. Story by Sokol Prifti.

There was a big crowd at the old clubhouse place! Surprisingly, **Billy Burchill, Blackie ,Ken Hayes, Tommy Lo, Todd Alger, Paul Greene, John Wong, Mike O'Brien, Rick Hovey**, and I showed up; however, only 4 of us were ready to go diving that morning - John,Mike, Rick, and I! After some backand-forth, the group decided to go up north, and I thought 40 steps Nahant might be a good place to go! For the rest of the group, it was an early breakfast.

It was a beautiful day when we arrived, sunny, flat ocean, and gorgeous water! Initially, we decided to dive as a group, but then we split in two pairs, John and I and Mike and Rick. We planned the dive and once we hit the water, the water temperature was 47°F and visibility was awesome! We swam through beautiful formations under water, but John had problems with his buoyancy, as did Mike from the other group.

After fixing the problem, we continue the dive to a maximum depth 26-28 feet, for about 45 minutes, and after that we discussed buoyancy and weight belt issues.



I caught three lobsters, and on the way home, we thanked again the Nahant Police Department for letting us dive in the ocean and enjoy the day!

Diving White Beach. Sunday December 4, 2022. *Story & photos by Rob Robison* I made it to the rendezvous point, the Beverly Service Plaza Burger King, ahead of time and met up with Neptune Matt Meyer. We drove over to White Beach, a new dive site for me, in Manchester-by-the-Sea, where John Updike used to live at the time of his

death. We were both wearing our drysuits in salt

water for the first time this late fall Sunday morning.

The water was flat and calm, but one could tell there had been recent storm activity from the piles of seaweed on the beach. We dressed at a leisurely pace and helped each other with various pieces of gear. Drysuit diving requires more complex gear assembly. Then, we lumbered across the sand and waded into the lapping water.

Once our fins were snuggly on our feet, we deflated our BCs and headed





for the bottom, a scant 8 feet down. I struggled mightily and unsuccessfully to reach the bottom, much less stay there, realizing intuitively I had forgotten to add 4lbs. of lead to my weight pockets. So, I trudged back to shore and picked up the extra weights and waded back out in the water so Matt could help me with them.

Once squared away, we headed back down, this time successfully, but there was very little to see, save a starfish, some crabs, a couple of mussels, and lots of seaweed in the 4-7' vis. We mutually called the dive 24 minutes later and exited the 47° water, having reached a max depth of 14', but happy with having made our first ocean dives of the winter season clad in our drysuits. Most importantly, we remained totally dry! Victory!

We celebrated our good fortune at a local breakfast bar before heading back home.

Special thanks to Matt for his patience helping me suit up and remove gear afterwards. I'm just not as flexible as I used to be. Having a good dive buddy is key to enjoying the underwater world, regardless of age. Matt's one of the best. Unfortunately,I don't have as much opportunity to dive with him as I'd like. We both agreed to try to rectify that situation next year!

Although the long range forecast for the week posited Saturday as the prime dive day of the weekend, when the time came to get wet, Neptune dive buddy Jason Brown and I decided Little Pond in Morton Park (Plymouth) would make a more suitable dive site than Plymouth Long Beach, where the vis had turned to zero and the waters a bit too rough for an easy, trouble free entry.

Before heading to our revised dive site, I checked on another prospective Neptune dive buddy for the day, Sokol Prifti. Apparently, he had overslept and decided he wanted to join us. So, he threw on his clothes, filled his dive bag with the essentials, and hustled down. He arrived just as Jason and I were about to finish suiting up. Unfortunately, in his haste





Sokol had left a dive boot behind and couldn't make the dive after all. So, he beachmastered for us and took the bulk of the photos. Thanks, Sokol!

Jason and I completed our preparations and headed across the sand and into the water, where we put on our fins, and I turned on my new GoPro-style underwater camera to give it the first of what will be many shakedown attempts before a winter trip to the equator. We submerged immediately and drifted down below over the sand lip toward the icons, which we found by following the readily visible guideline that led us to the flag. Jason had never seen the figurines before, which are not shown in this epistle because I mistakenly had turned off my camera when I thought I had turned it on. This mistake was made numerous times before I finally got the hang of it toward the end of the dive. Fortunately, anything remotely animated, besides us, was

nowhere to be found, meaning I didn't miss taking any shots of things heretofore unseen. Thank goodness!

Twenty-three minutes after beginning the dive, Jason and I emerged from 19', in 47° waters, to be welcomed by Sokol and glorious sunshine, as opposed to the 5'-10 ' lugubrious vis we experienced during the dive.

We packed up our gear, took a group selfie, and headed off. Sokol needed to go home, and we decided grub was in order first. We settled on the 3A Café in North Plymouth, where we were served a

wonderful, old fashioned, American breakfast, washed down with mugs of steaming hot coffee. Then, it was time to hurry off on our separate ways, Jason to Boston, and I to nearby Kingston. The Michigan vs Ohio State game beckoned. Evidently, I shouldn't have hurried to watch that match after

all. 😉

Oh well. There's always next year. In the meantime, safe living and safe diving with great dive buddies, like Jason Brown and Sokol Prifti, folks. It doesn't get any better than this.

To make a holiday wish come true For someone near and dear to you

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
